Leaf collection has been quite a challenge this year. Our DPW Sub-Committee has come up with another solution that they feel is truly the answer. For the past several weeks, and continuing on through the month of December, we are doing continuous leaf pickup. We have divided the Township in half and have crews picking up leaves in both "sections" all of the time. We will make at least two pickups in each section, and in the "leafier sections, we may be able to make a third pick up. Now all we need is Mother Nature's cooperation. If the leaves fall, and the storms stay at bay, we will be in great shape. For the future we are looking into a program where residents or their landscapers can bring the leaves to a compost site, in addition to the township pickup.

The Public Safety Sub-Committee did not recommend a deer hunt on Bayonet Farm this year. Unfortunately, due to circumstances beyond our control, many of the hunters chose not to continue to hunt last year; thus yielding only 2 deer. We are working with opponents of the hunt to resolve the deer issue in a less lethal way. They are looking into grants and other methods of thinning the herd. However, the County is holding its hunt on portions of Holmdel Park, (as well as other County parks) so please be aware when you are using the trails. (Continued on Page 2)

CELEBRATES NATIONAL RED RIBBON WEEK OCTOBER 23-31

Holmdel Alliance promotes that Great American Smokeout

To help raise awareness of the dangers of tobacco use, especially for children, the Holmdel Alliance will be sponsoring various activities in the high school and middle school on November 18th in recognition of the **Great American Smokeout**.

The Great American Smokeout is an annual event that is held on the third Thursday in November each year. This year the event date is November 18. The Great American Smokeout is held annually to encourage Americans (of whom 45.8 million smoke) to quit tobacco smoking. The Great American Smokeout has been held for more than 30 years and helps to spotlight the dangers of tobacco use and the challenges of quitting.

On this day smokers are challenged to not smoke a cigarette for 24 hours with the hope that their decision to quit for 24 hours will turn into a decision to stop smoking forever.

Throughout the United States there are an estimated 47 million adults who currently smoke and approximately half will die prematurely from smoking. The leading cause of cancer death for both men and women is lung cancer and this year there will be about 170,000 new cases of lung cancer diagnosed in the U.S. More than 80 percent of all lung cancers are thought to result from smoking. Each year, nearly 500,000 Americans die from tobacco use. One of every six deaths in the United States is a result of smoking tobacco, making tobacco more lethal than all other addictive drugs combined.

All Smokers - Accept the challenge on November 18 – don't smoke for 24 hours

Take the opportunity on November 18 to stop smoking and commit to making it the first day of a long-term plan to quit for good. Get help to quit. Without help, only 1 in 20 smokers who try to quit are able to do so. There are many things you can do to greatly increase your success such as medications, nicotine gum or patch and counseling.

Remember - Being tobacco free is the most important thing you can do for your health

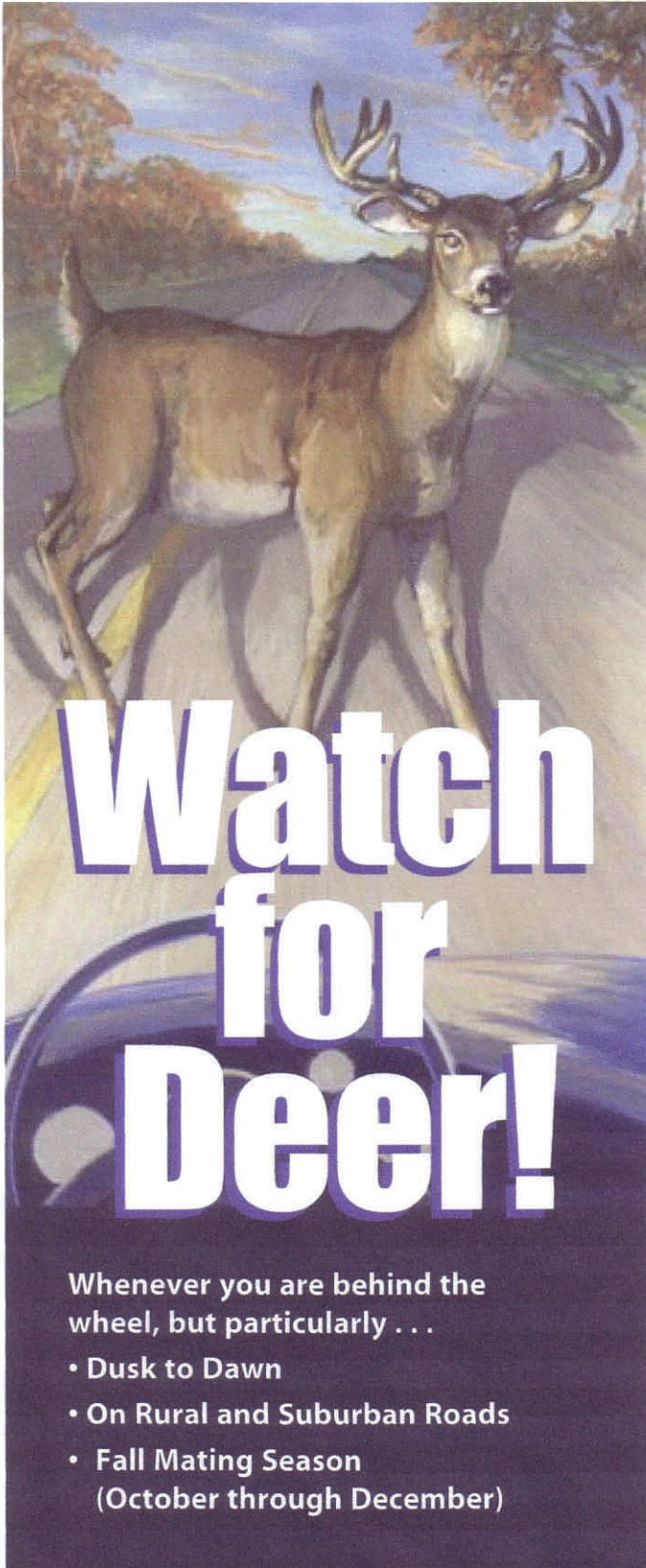

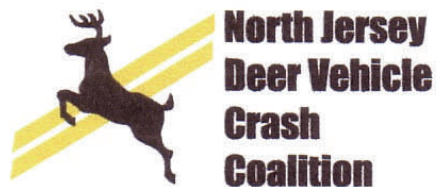
Deer are everywhere!

- There are more than 15,000 deer-vehicle crashes in New Jersey each year.
- A deer crash can happen anytime — but half occur from October through December, and three quarters happen from dusk to dawn.
- Deer crashes can occur almost anywhere outside of dense urban areas.
- Many deer crashes occur on two-lane roads with no median.
- Every year, deer crashes in New Jersey cause millions of dollars in vehicle damage, injuries, and even deaths.

Reduce your risk!

- **Slow down** — If you see one deer, more may follow.
- **Don't swerve** — If a crash is unavoidable, break firmly and stay in your lane.
- **Keep headlights clean and aligned** — Use high beams when possible.
- **Always buckle up** — It could save your life.

ICE & SNOW

Remove it Before you Go

- △ Remember to remove all snow and ice from your vehicle before driving, especially from the hood, windows and roof.
- △ It's the Law in New Jersey
- △ Motorists who fail to do so can cause property damage and/or injury to others and face fines of not less than \$200 or more than \$1,000 for each offense.

Winter Driving Tips

- △ Drive slow (at or below the posted speed limit) and adjust your speed for the changing road conditions.
- △ Turn on your headlights, using low beams when traveling in snow.
- △ Increase your following distance. In winter weather, travel at least eight to 10 seconds behind the car in front of you.
- △ Give snowplows plenty of room to work. Don't tailgate and try not to pass. If you must pass, take extreme caution in doing so. Remember, a snowplow operator's field of vision is restricted. You may see them, but they don't see you.
- △ If you skid, don't brake or accelerate. Remove your foot from the gas, and gently steer your car in the direction of the skid (the direction the rear of your vehicle is sliding.) When your car starts heading in the desired direction, carefully straighten the wheel.
- △ Slow down before exiting the highway. Exit ramps often have icy patches, sharp curves and stalled or stopped vehicles.
- △ Have a personal safety kit easily accessible in your vehicle that includes: an ice scraper/brush; shovel; jumper cables or battery starter; blanket; sand, salt or kitty litter for traction; lock de-icer; flashlight and new batteries; extra windshield wiper fluid; safety flare/warning device; cell phone with a spare battery; water and non-perishable food; and paper towels or cloth.
- △ If your vehicle does become disabled, pull off the road as far as possible and turn on your emergency flashers. Remain with your vehicle until help arrives. If you can't get your vehicle off the road and are uncertain about your safety, do not stay in your vehicle or stand behind it. Proceed carefully to a safe location away from traffic.

Holmdel Township's Adopted Unit

In October 2010 the Township of Holmdel adopted the **52nd Ordnance** Group currently serving in Afghanistan.

The 52nd Ordnance Group (EOD) is the command and control headquarters for all Army Explosive ordnance disposal (EOD) companies and battalions located in the continental United States (CONUS), to include the US Virgin Islands and Puerto Rico. Subordinate units maintain EOD Response Teams which evaluate, render safe, and remove conventional, chemical/biological, or nuclear ordnance, or improvised explosive devices that pose an immediate threat to public safety. While subordinate units are trained and equipped for combat operations, they may also support a variety of peacetime missions, to include range surface clearance operations of active Army installations.

The adoption is part of the *America Supporting Americans* Program (ASA) that seeks to bond American communities with American men and women serving in the military.

With the Holidays fast approaching, it is hoped that Township residents will show support for the soldiers while they are so far away from home and their families.

SHOPPING BAG INCENTIVE PROGRAM

In an effort to enhance our recycling program, and reduce the ongoing problem of plastic shopping bags littering our landscapes and clogging our waterways, the Township of Holmdel is purchasing reusable shopping bags for Township residents to use for their shopping needs.

Bring 20 or more plastic shopping bags to the Clerk's office at Town Hall between the hours of 9:00 am—4:00 pm Monday through Friday. Two reusable shopping bags per residential address will be given in exchange for 20 or more plastic bags.

The plastic bags will be recycled through Goodwill Industries. They recycle them through their "Bag Smart" program. The plastic bags are sorted and baled by Goodwill employees, then transported to Penn Jersey Paper who facilitates their conversion into plastic decking materials.

The shopping bags are being purchased utilizing grant funds supplied by the Department of Environmental Protection. The grant is issued each year to municipalities in New Jersey submitting a tonnage grant application. Money issued is based on the amount of recyclables a municipality recycles.

Recycling makes cents for our Town.

RECYCLING BROCHURES

In an effort to reduce publishing and mail costs the Township will not be mailing residents a 2011 "green" Recycling Schedule as in the past. Newspapers, Commingles, Mixed Paper and Corrugated Cardboard can be brought to the Public Works Facility, 14 Crawfords Corner Rd., Monday-Friday, 8:00 am-2:30 pm. Hazardous and large item materials will not be accepted.

3) DOES THE TOWNSHIP OFFER A "BULK-PICK-UP PROGRAM"?

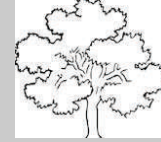
A Large Item Drop Off Service is offered to residents on various Saturdays from April through October at the Public Works Facility from 8:00AM-2:00PM. CHANGES IN COMPUTER & ELECTRONIC RECYCLING

Effective January 1, 2011 the State is banning the disposal of computers, televisions and other "covered devices" from landfills. Homeowners, businesses and institutions may not place these items in the trash, and public or private haulers will be prohibited from picking up these items for disposal. The County will be partnering with Holmdel and year round recycling of these items will be available to all residents and small businesses.



SHADE TREE COMMISSION



WHERE DO FALL TREE COLORS COME FROM?

Every year we all look forward to the beautiful fall colors on our trees. But where do these colors come from? When we were little, the answer was “Jack Frost”, but that’s not the real answer.

The timing of fall color change is brought on by the decline in daylight hours that signals the onset of winter. No other environmental factor, whether temperature, food supply or rainfall, is as constant as the steady drop of sunlight in the fall. Tender leaves would freeze in winter, so plants must either harden them or dispose of them. Evergreens protect their foliage by giving each needle a heavy wax coating creating natural antifreeze for cell fluids. Broadleaf trees begin the processes that allow them to seal off and ultimately shed their leaves.

Nature’s fall palette features four primary pigments: chlorophyll, which gives leaves their summer time shades of green, carotene, which produces yellows and oranges, tannin, which engenders browns, and anthocyanin, which creates reds and purples. During the growing season, the leaves of broadleaf trees are busily producing sugars from carbon dioxide and water via the action of sunlight on chlorophyll, the process known as photosynthesis. Because sunlight breaks down chlorophyll, plants must continually replace it. In summer the abundance of chlorophyll causes leaves to appear green – even in species like beech, whose leaves hold considerable quantities of carotene and tannin.

In the fall, the veins that carry fluids in and out of the leaves gradually close down in preparation for leaf fall, slowing and eventually stopping the flow of chlorophyll. Soon the chlorophyll completely disappears, allowing the orange and yellow carotenes and brown tannins to stand out.

As the veins shut, they also trap sugars in the leaf. In some trees – maple and sumac, for example, the sugars trapped in the leaves react to form anthocyanins.

The reaction requires bright sunlight and does not occur until the concentration of sugar in the sap is quite high.

The range and intensity of colors that develop are greatly influenced by the weather. Low temperatures break down chlorophyll and promote the formation of the anthocyanins. Dry weather limits water intake, thereby increasing the sugar concentration in sap. Favorable conditions – abundant sugar and plentiful daylight – spur production of anthocyanins, bringing brilliant reds, purples and crimsons to the fall landscape. Yellows, oranges and golds remain fairly steady from year to year, because tannins and carotene are always present.

The amount of moisture in the soil also influences autumn colors. This of course varies from year to year. Summer drought stresses trees, causing them to lose their leaves or start color production prematurely generally leading to a dull season. Sufficient summer rains however promote leaf retention, good tree health, and thus more brilliant autumn colors.

Regardless of conditions, Holmdel usually does have a beautiful fall. Be sure to get outside, walk in our parks, and enjoy this colorful season before all the leaves are gone and the landscape turns white.

NEW JERSEY AMERICAN WATER

CHANGING WATER METERS


As a regulated utility, New Jersey American Water is required by the Board of Public Utilities to change residential customer meters every ten years. To help stay in compliance with this regulation, New Jersey American Water has contracted with In-Line Services to help the company perform this necessary task. In Line services, on behalf of New Jersey American Water, mails letters to customers in an attempt to schedule a meter change. The letter asks that customers simply call New Jersey American Water to schedule the meter change.

In accordance with the regulations, New Jersey American Water reserves the right to discontinue water service to any customer who repeatedly fails to allow them to change out the meter.

Discontinuing water service is a last resort of the water company and is only used when a customer has neglected to respond to three or more attempts to schedule an appointment.

Once a meter is changed, the old meter is taken to a state-certified meter testing facility where it is tested. If the meter is found to have been running fast, New Jersey American Water will issue a credit to that customer.

Snow Removal:

The Township's snow removal regulations requires property owners shall remove all accumulations of snow or ice from the sidewalks abutting their property within twenty-four (24) hours after the cessation of snowfall or formation of ice. In the event of ice, which may be so frozen as to make removal impractical, the property owner shall cause same to be thoroughly covered with sand, ashes or a traction enhancing product within twenty-four (24) hours after the cessation of the snow fall or formation of ice. The property owner shall be responsible for snow removal from sidewalks abutting the rear of their property. Residents are asked to instruct private contractors who are engaged to plow their driveways not to push snow into the streets or to throw, place or deposit snow or ice that has accumulated on private property, including private driveways, upon streets within the Township. You can help to protect your home or business in case of an emergency by keeping fire hydrants clear of ice and snow.
